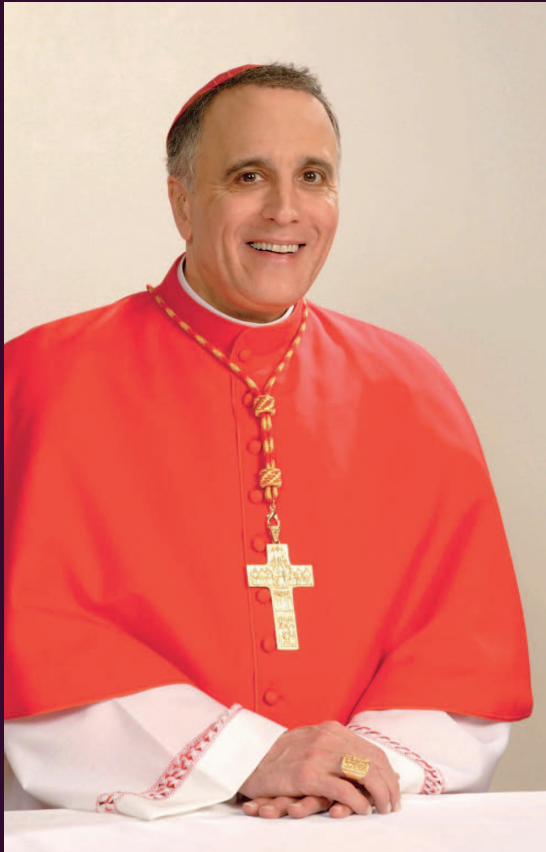


A Beacon of Healing





A NOTE FROM THE CARDINAL

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In 1847, with the founding of what was then the Diocese of Galveston, God filled Bishop Jean Marie Odin, the first bishop in Texas, with the strength to face the challenges of preaching the Gospel and bringing the sacraments to those living in the frontier land of Texas. Accompanying Bishop Odin were the Ursuline Sisters who made it their mission to educate Catholic children and to form them in the faith. Together, they built upon the foundation laid by Franciscan missionaries and others who had been ministering in Texas since the 17th century.

While we celebrate and honor our past, the work of this local Church continues. Today, the Archdiocese of Galveston-Houston continues to care for our local

community in a multitude of ways. In Houston alone we are home to seven health care centers, four homes for the aged, and four residential care facilities for children. Additionally, we are home to a seminary, university, eleven high schools, forty-six elementary schools, and nearly one-hundred and fifty parishes. These incredible expressions of our faith provide outreach to the more than 1.7 million area Catholics as well as all people who are in need.

Last year, San José Clinic also marked one hundred years of mission-focused healthcare to our uninsured brothers and sisters. Since its inception, the Clinic has served our community in the way that Christ commands us to serve one another. St. Paul's Letter to the Ephesians reminds us to "be kind to one another, compassionate, forgiving one another as God has forgiven you in Christ." This command resonates all throughout the Clinic's walls. The kindness and compassion offered to the patients by Clinic staff and volunteers reflects the way that Christ cares for us. This offering is made possible because of your steadfast commitment to the Clinic's magnificent work. On behalf of the Archdiocese of Galveston-Houston and the San José Clinic, thank you for your continued support.

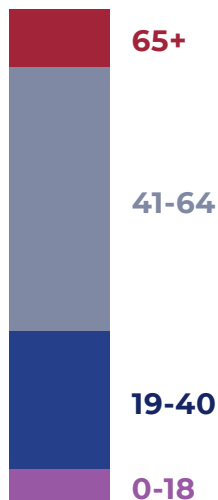

MISSION

The mission of San José Clinic is to provide healing through quality healthcare and education with respect and compassion for those with limited access to care.

San José Clinic was founded in 1922 with the vision of Monsignor George Walsh, a donation of \$59 from the Charity Guild of Catholic Women, and the service of community volunteers, who all came together with the same hope of breaking down barriers to healthcare for the underserved. For nearly a century, the Clinic has grown from a small frame house to a healthcare facility with two locations, and it has become one of the leading providers of quality healthcare services for the underserved in the Greater Houston area.

Today, we proudly uphold the legacy of our founders by continuing to provide healthcare for those who need a health home the most, including primary and specialty medical and dental care as well as vision, laboratory and pharmacy services. San José Clinic is a ministry of the Archdiocese of Galveston-Houston, a Texas Medical Center member institution, and a United Way partner.

Charity Guild of Catholic Women



The Charity Guild of Catholic Women is a philanthropic organization supporting the San José Clinic for over 100 years since our founding in 1922. Under the leadership of Katherine (Mrs. Lucian B.) Carroll and Theodora (Mrs. W. E.) Kendall, fifty-nine women contributed a dollar each to rent the Clinic's first location at 1900 Franklin Street while actively seeking out Houston providers to donate their time to provide care. The Charity Guild of Catholic Women has donated over \$3 million to the Clinic since 1982 and continues to make an annual gift.

Founded in the Progressive Era tradition of social housekeeping, the Charity Guild of Catholic Women played a crucial role in the creation and ongoing success of the Clinic. The Charity Guild of Catholic Women raised money and organized efforts to provide medical care to the poor, including renting the Clinic's first location and expanding services over the years.

In addition to their financial contributions, the Charity Guild of Catholic Women sponsors specific programs at the Clinic, such as the Patient Christmas Party, which dates back to 1927, and Back-to-School events that provide children with books and school supplies. Their proactive and philanthropic contributions and Monsignor Walsh's recognition of their efforts laid the groundwork for the successful Clinic and charitable organization that have both blossomed over the last century. The continued support of the Charity Guild of Catholic Women has been integral to the ongoing success of the San José Clinic in providing much-needed healthcare services to the poor in Houston.



Forever Healing: Compassionate Care

“I owe everything to San José Clinic. Without these guys in the pharmacy, I would be dead. San José Clinic saved my life. Two years ago I had an episode in the parking lot. I was headed to admissions to fill out paperwork and I knew I wasn’t feeling right. I had low blood sugar and I spaced out. I went a little crazy, but they got me a soda and a snack and they could tell what was going on. I have Type 1 Diabetes and they got me into the program really quickly. I wasn’t working steady and they sent me to the food bank, it was really nice. They know you have to eat if you’re a diabetic, we aren’t supposed to miss meals. After getting accepted, I was able to get my A1C down and now I am just staying on top of the disease.”

Greg Brandani came to San José Clinic, after losing his insurance when he was laid off due to a work injury. Greg worked off shore for 16 years, and after suffering his back injury, lost all his benefits.

“San José Clinic has been bending over backwards for me. They’re always upbeat and positive. For anyone who’s been in any kind of trouble, even financial, and find yourself on hard times, it’s good to know there’s someone out there. I had nowhere to go, and San José was there. Without them I wouldn’t have had the chance. I’m just grateful.”
